

Pastor's Ponderings

Greetings in the Name of the One who was born, died, and rose for our sins,

By the time you read this edition of the Circuit Rider, we will have celebrated Thanksgiving. What things are you thankful for this year? Your home, family, and friends? These are the things that most of us list, but do you think about those who have no family, friends, and place to call their own? There are people who have lost their family, were given up by family, or who are estranged from family. Sad but true. Have you become an adopted family by someone who most likely treasures you?

Paula and I are thankful for the people in the churches of the Tri-County Parish, and the extended churches in the Canton area. We are thankful for the house that you provide, and our neighbors and friends who make it a home. We thank God often for you who make our lives comfortable and happy, and for those who challenge us to be better, and more than we thought that we could be. We pray for you often!

As we take a breath after Thanksgiving, we realize that we are in the season of Advent. The four Sundays that we prepare ourselves, heart and soul, for the coming of the source of Salvation, the Messiah, who is Jesus Christ. We don't plop a bowl of ingredients into a cake pan, and bake it. Some recipes need close attention paid to what gets mixed with what, the consistency of the butter and other ingredients, etc. We don't nail a piece of trim around a door, and then cut it to fit. We prepare the surface, and cut the trim, then dry-fit it. When all is good, we fasten it. We don't meet with someone without preparing ourselves first by showering and making ourselves presentable.

We should not rush the seasons of our lives, and the church year. This is a time to ready ourselves for the Messiah to again reside in our hearts. Ecclesiastes 3 gives us a sense of being patient and honoring each season, while Philippians 4:8 tells us to focus on what is pure and good. If we rush the season, we miss the opportunity to prepare.

Not many of us are ready for Christmas. There is decorating, baking, buying, wrapping, visiting, and a whole list of other things that we need to do to get ready for Jesus' birthday. Take the time in the busyness of these next days and weeks to focus again on what it means to be a follower of Christ Jesus.

Many of us haven't caught up from the last season. We haven't got the outside furniture inside and covered up. We haven't put our summer cloths away, and replaced them with our warmer ones. Some of us haven't even started our spring cleaning, let alone our fall cleaning. Please use these next weeks to prepare for the coming of Christ so that our Christmas season that starts on December 25 can be all that God wants it to be for us.

May God bless each one of you this Advent and Christmas season. May you feel the love of God, and share that love with others because you are too full to contain the love of Christ in your life. Continue to be the neighbor that God is calling you to be in your personal life settings, be it a personal care home, work, or in the celebrations and tragedies of life.

Minister's Musings

While searching for a theme for this month's newsletter, I came upon a little book on my shelf, "My Favorite Hymns", by Norman Vincent Peale. I opened it to the story of our most popular Christmas carol, "Silent Night, Holy Night", written by Joseph Mohr in 1818, a parish priest in Oberndorf, Austria, high in the Tyrolian Alps. As he was preparing for the traditional Christmas Eve Mass, he learned the church's organ was broken. It was unthinkable to have a Christmas service without music, so he decided to write his own song. He penned the words and gave them to the organist, Franz Gruber, who was excited by the words. He had long believed the perfect Christmas carol had never been written. He set the words to music and on Christmas Eve, he and Mohr sang the new song accompanied by Gruber's guitar. The church choir joined in on the last phrase of each stanza.


But a series of little events eventually brought the piece to the world's attention. German immigrants brought the carol to America where it was first published in a Methodist hymnal in 1849, and in 1863 it was translated into English by John Young, an Episcopal bishop in the same version we still sing today.

Silent night, holy night,
All is calm, all is bright
Round yon virgin mother and child.
Holy infant so tender and mild,
Sleep in heavenly peace,
Sleep in heavenly peace.

Silent night, holy night,
Shepherds quake, at the sight,
Glories stream from heaven afar,
Heavenly hosts sing alleluia,
Christ the Savior is born,
Christ the Savior is born.

Silent night, holy night,
Son of God, love's pure light
Radiant beams from the holy face,
With the dawn of redeeming grace,
Jesus Lord, at thy birth
Jesus Lord, at thy birth.

My Christmas wish for you is that your Christmas Season will honor that Holy Child with your calmness and peacefulness. Because this time that is so often a time of cleaning, shopping and hurrying to find the perfect gift for all on your list, I pray that it will instead be a blessed time of thankfulness for the wonderful gift of Jesus' perfect life and his gift to us of redeeming grace. Please have a joyous, holy night with the Son of God, love's purest light!

A Christmas party for the adult Sunday school class is scheduled for Dec. 17. It will be held at Kelley's once again this year. More details in the bulletin.


Thank you to Beverly and Jim Unruh for hosting the monthly prayer breakfast. It is always a meaningful time for those who attend.

Gingerbread Cut-Out Cookies

Ingredients:

3/4 cup brown sugar, packed
1/2 cup butter
2 eggs
1/4 cup molasses
3 3/4 cups flour
1 Tablespoon pumpkin pie spice
1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda



Directions:

Cream sugar, butter, eggs and molasses. Stir in dry ingredients; mix well

Chill dough for one hour or until firm.

Roll out to 1/8 to 1/4 inch thickness on a floured surface. Cut into desired shapes.

Bake on a greased baking sheet at 350 degrees for 10 minutes or until set.
