

Then I think about the people of Florida and surrounding areas who are in complete disorganization, and I realize I am blessed to have the simple disruption in my life. I have a roof over my head, clothes on my back, I am not trying to find drinking water or a place to lay down at night. I am truly blessed by God! No, my life isn't perfect. I have struggles like everyone else, but my God is good. Whatever struggles come my way; He is there with me to see me through.

Matthew 6: 31-33, 31 "So don't worry about these things, saying, 'What will we eat? What will we drink? What will we wear?' 32 These things dominate the thoughts of unbelievers, but your heavenly Father already knows all your needs. 33 Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and live righteously, and he will give you everything you need. ### Month of Thanksgiving for the Canton Food Pantry

Last year, many of you put together a food box to help the Canton Food pantry with their Month of Thanksgiving gift boxes. We thought it would be a great opportunity again this year to help out. You can either fill your own box or fill boxes together as a church. **Boxes are due by Wednesday, November 30, 2022.** 

We will start at the beginning. Genesis 1:11 tells us that God planted every good kind of seedbearing vegetation. Let's put some <u>cans of fruit</u> into our box. We remember the soup Jacob made for his hungry brother, Esau, so we will add **cans of soup** and a **can of beans**. We remember how God promised the Israelites a land flowing with milk and honey so, lets add a can of evaporated milk and something sweet like syrup or a bag of sugar. Next, we remember how they grumbled in the wilderness because they had no food and God sent manna in the morning and quail in the evening. Let's add a box of cereal and a can of chicken or another kind of canned meat. And when Moses and the people arrived at Mount Sinai, God tells them to wash their clothes and prepare themselves because God himself was coming down in the sight of all people. Which means cleanliness is next to godliness! Let's add laundry detergent and dish soap. We remember how God using ravens provided food for Elijah in the wilderness, so we add a box of crackers. A widow, during the famine, made bread for Elijah using her last bit of flour and oil and God made sure she had flour and oil until the famine was over. Let's add a **bag of flour** and a **bottle of vegetable oil**. We remember how Daniel insisted on only eating vegetables instead of "royal food" when he was first taken captive by the Babylonians and how much healthier he was than the other captives. Let's add some cans of vegetables. We remember how Jesus washed his disciples' feet at the Passover meal so we add soap (a bar of bottle of body wash) Then we will add some tuna fish (or another kind of canned fish) as we remember how Jesus cooked fish on the beach for Peter, John and five other disciples. Now as we are reminded how God has provided through the centuries, let's be thankful and generous and add some fun things such as toilet paper, tissues, and a sweet treat like a package of cookies or bag of candy.

The food pantry is truly blessed to have folks like you to help your neighbors in need. God bless you!

#### The East Canton Methodist Church 1817-1963 (Part II)

The following condensed article was written in March, 1963, by Miss Clara Smiley (1893-1986), who taught history at CHS, was historian and member of the East Canton UM Church.

Between 1955 and 1962 alterations were made which added to the beauty, comfort, and convenience of the church. The old sheds and "hitching rails" had long since disappeared. Now parking spaces were arranged for cars and a new driveway laid out around the church. The land needed for this on the east was given to the church by Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Harkness. A lavatory was installed in the basement. An attractive front entrance was built. The sanctuary was redecorated, and the latest improvement was the addition of a much-needed Education Building which was completed and first used in January, 1962. The new building, adjoining the church on the north and extending to the east, has five classrooms, hallway and lavatory.

In spite of all the changes through the years, the beautiful old church still remains its colonial appearance and atmosphere. A lower pulpit, divided Chancel, modern lighting, electric organ and comfortable oak pews have only added to the simple dignity of the sanctuary.

In June, 1962, the Church was transferred from the Syracuse area and now is in the Central Pennsylvania Conference of the Pittsburgh area.

The church and parsonage properties and buildings are under the management and control of the trustees of the church. According to a most unusual provision of the Charter granted to the church by the State of Pennsylvania. The three trustees serve for life unless they resign their office. In case of the death or resignation of one, a successor is chosen by the pastor of the church and the two remaining trustees. And so, from the time of those first three trustees in 1832, Solomon Brown, Elisha Bloom, and Levi Landon, the duties of the office have, until recently, been chosen on by a board of only three men so chosen. The present trustees elected under the provision of the charter are Harvey Wright, Ray Stanbery, and Henry Stone. Finally, it was felt that, because of increasing duties, it was advisable to have a larger board of trustees, and three others were elected by a Quarterly Conference in 1962. These three, Dean Bedford, John Brackman and Arthur Harkness, will serve three-year terms. However, the church will continue to have three others chosen for life terms. These men, like their predecessors, serve loyally and give generously and unstintingly of their time.

It would be impossible to list all of the loyal members and friends who have, through the years, worked faithfully for the spiritual growth of the East Canton United Methodist Church; therefore, none have been named. What they accomplished is a challenge to those who carry on the work today.

### **Pecan Pie Cookies**

Prep Time: 20 mins, Cook Time: 10 mins, Additional Time: 30 mins, Total Time: 1 hr.

#### Ingredients

#### Filling:

- ¼ cup butter
- 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
- 3 tablespoons light corn syrup
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup finely chopped pecans

- Cookies:
  - 2 cups all-purpose flour
  - 1 teaspoon baking powder
  - 1 cup brown sugar, packed
  - <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup butter, softened
  - 1 large egg
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

#### Directions

- 1. To make the filling: Melt 1/4 cup of butter in a saucepan; stir in confectioners' sugar and corn syrup until sugar is dissolved. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring often, then stir in pecans until combined. Refrigerate the filling for 30 minutes to chill.
- 2. To make the cookies: Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Sift flour and baking powder together in a bowl; set aside.
- 3. Beat brown sugar, 3/4 cup butter, egg, and vanilla extract in a large bowl with an electric mixer on medium speed until the mixture is creamy, about 2 minutes. Gradually beat in flour mixture to form a dough.
- 4. Pinch off about 1 tablespoon of dough and roll into a ball; press into the bottom of an ungreased cupcake pan cup so it lines the bottom and sides, like a pie crust. Repeat with remaining dough. Fill each crust with about 1 teaspoon of the prepared pecan filling.
- 5. Bake in the preheated oven until the cookie shells are lightly browned, 10 to 13 minutes. Watch closely after 10 minutes. Let the cookies cool in the pans briefly before removing to a wire rack to finish cooling.
