Greetings in the Name of the Prince of Peace,

I have been in much prayer concerning the churches of the Tri-County Parish. I must admit that sometimes, those prayers are corporate for the whole church area. I apologize to you all for that lapse in my judgment. It is difficult to attend a seminar or training session, be asked to use my own example, and pick each church individually. There usually is not enough time built into the sessions to think of each specific church. Hence, being in much prayer for each church.

I have been choosing continuing education retreats, seminars, and training sessions, that specifically speak to the needs of **my** heart concerning the growth of CEP, St. John's, Shunk, and Ward United Methodist Churches. Page 10 **Remembering Roses** By Beverly Wright

Every year someone asks me if I still go out to California and work on the Rose Parade floats and this year, Pastor Jerry asked if I would write an article for the Circuit Rider. It's been 10 years since I have worked on the floats and it has been 14 years since I went out the 1st time for the 2002 parade.

That 1st year my sister-in-law and I were not sure we were even going to get there as our flight in Buffalo, NY was canceled due to a snowstorm. We debated whether to wait and see if we could get a flight the next day or drive to Pittsburgh to catch a flight that would take us to Washington, DC before flying to LA. We drove to Pittsburgh, and it was a good thing, as that was the year Buffalo got almost 7 ft. of snow during a 5-day snowstorm.

Work on the floats would start at 8:00 AM and continue until 11:00 PM except on December 30 when it would continue until everything was done into the early morning hours of the 31st. Fiesta Parade Floats had to have their floats ready and waiting for the 2nd round of judging at 9:00 AM. (The 1st round of judging was done during the decorating process). If you were still decorating for the 2nd round you got points taken off. There were usually different groups of volunteers that came at different times. We worked in the florist area where different flowers from all over the world were processed for the floats. It was fun to try to guess where the flowers came from. One year some boxes marked "tulips" came in. We knew where they came from—wrong—they came from California.

Our jobs could be anything from wrapping oasis in chicken wire, counting out 50 to 100 flowers per bucket, removing the stamen from the lilies, which we called "picking the nose of the lilies", clumping, which is sticking flowers in oasis, but not arranging them, and making rose balls, which were ½ spheres holding anywhere from 20 to 35 roses depending on how big the roses were.

One night as we were getting ready to call it quits when we were asked if we could remove the thorns from some roses before we left. It shouldn't take long, there were only 600. Another time on the last day of decorating, 60,000 roses had to be put on the Dr. Pepper float and everyone was tired, but a group of Girl Scouts were recruited to finish the project.

Sometimes a special color of roses is desired and is develop just for that purpose. When you see buckets of fresh brown roses, all you can think is, who would want a brown rose. Until you see four different shades of brown roses being used to create beautiful wood paneling for a station wagon.

One year there was a shortage of red carnations. 60,000 carnations were needed to decorate Uncle Sam's red coat. Every inch of the float has to be decorated with organic material. The back of his coat was a little sparse around the bottom, but other flowers kind of sprang up from the float to cover it up. Another time, there was forsythia that wasn't in full bloom. I had to move it around to find a warm spot of sunshine to get it to open up.

You don't really understand their size until you see them up close. There is no limit on size except they must be able to retract to under 17 1/2 –ft. in 60 seconds to get under an underpass on Colorado Boulevard. Also, they must be able to make the corner at Orange Grove and Colorado Boulevards. The average float is 55 ft. long, 30 ft. high and 18 ft. wide. The number of flowers on the average float would supply an average florist for 5 years. The 1st year that Fiesta Parade Floats did the Rose Queen float they were required to put at least 5,000 roses on it. They put 15,000 roses on it. They estimate 18 million flowers are used to decorate the floats each year.

We didn't work with dried material, but it was the dry material that amazed me. The plant materials can be fresh, dried, chopped, sliced, ground, ironed, but never dyed. You never realize how much rolled oats, coconut, and cinnamon they use until you work on the floats. How many pounds of black onion seeds to make black stripes on a tiger that is bigger than a Clydesdale? To get skin tones for their human characters they use a mix of crushed walnut shells, cinnamon, cornmeal, and paprika. A toadstool could have a cap made out of slices of dried oranges, grapefruit, or lemons. Another one might be made out of ironed corn husks with groups of roses for dots.

And the use of fruits and vegetables. A border around the bottom of the float could contain a mixture of sweet corn, peppers, cauliflower, carrots, and onions, along with a few flowers, of course. A competing float company used blueberries to create tiles for a floor. Potatoes and small gray squash became cobble stones on a path. Kidney beans make a beautiful looking train engine along with more black onion seeds.

We saw some teenagers flattening apricots and asked what they were going to be used for. They had no idea, but later we saw someone gluing them onto an orange stegosaurus as part of its hide, and its underbelly was made of golden raisins, which had to be glued one at a time.

Of course, you cannot forget the people you meet from all over the country. A lady who was originally from the Philippines, came into the area where I was working. Someone had told her we had Bells-of Ireland and wanted to know what they looked like. She had lived in the area for 40 years and it was her 1st time to work on the floats. She had a very interesting story of how she came to the US.

Then there is Johnnie. It was the last full day of decorating. I noticed a lady sitting all by herself at breakfast at the motel we were staying. I asked if she would like to join us. She noticed our flora badges that got us into our work areas and asked what we were doing. She asked if she could help, her husband was going to watch football games all day and she had to entertain herself. She was a lifesaver for us that 1st year. It turned out she worked for a florist for 10 years and when we were asked to go get a flower that we didn't know what it was, all we had to do was ask her. And she knew the tricks of the trade.

My sister-in-law and I went 4 times together and had a wonderful time with great experiences.

Mini Oreo Cheesecakes

Ingredients:

16 oz. cream cheese, softened
1/2 cup sour cream
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs
Oreos, 12 whole, 5 crushed

Directions:



In a large bowl, combine cream cheese, sour cream, sugar and vanilla with a hand mixer. When they are well combined, beat in the eggs. Set aside.

Line a cupcake pan with paper liners. Place an Oreo in the bottom of each cup. Fill each cup with the cream cheese mixture. Top with some crushed Oreos.

Bake at 275 degrees for 22 minutes. Cool, then refrigerate for 3 hours. These freeze well for future use!

Directions:


Sprinkle marshmallows in a greased 13x9 inch bake pan. Prepare cake batter according to package directions; put over the marshmallows. Spoon pie filling over the batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool. Frost with whipped topping. Store in the refrigerator. I prefer to refrigerate cake without the topping and put the topping on each piece when I am ready to serve the cake.

24 Hour Prayer Vigil Set

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Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

On May 10 - 20, 2016, 864 delegates from all around the world will gather in Portland, Oregon for General Conference 2016. Held every four years, with the guidance of God's Spirit, the future direction of our United Methodist Church is crafted and held up before the whole church for our life together.

This conference gathering will be both a challenge and an opportunity for the delegates representing our United Methodist Conferences to act as the church's top legislative body. All delegates are elected by their annual conferences to serve. Half of the delegates are lay and half are clergy. In the course of these 11 days, the delegates will prayerfully church's set the official position and church policies regarding such important issues as mission, vision, discipleship, structure, spiritual formation, human sexuality, war, peace and set the General Church funding for ministry plan for the next four years.

On December 2, 2015, our Council of Bishops encouraged each of our 131 Conferences to hold a **24 hour prayer vigil**. In so doing one conference will be continually praying for our delegates, bishops and leadership for the 131 days leading up to General Conference!

Our **Susquehanna Conference 24 Hour Prayer Vigil** is set for **March 4th, from 12:00 am through 11:59 pm.** We are asking pastors and local church leaders to organize a vigil in their congregation or charge and join our other 900+ local churches in prayer for that 24 hour period. Each church or charge can develop their own plan which will fit their needs. *The important thing is that we all covenant together to do our part of this important prayer vigil!!*

"Morning, Mr. Pop"

His "calling card" is the kind the children at Bellevue like best.

Two nurses, standing at the doorway of New York's Bellevue Hospital, smiled as the short, chubby old man trudged down the hall, a battered canvas satchel in hand. A doctor looked up, grinned broadly and said, "Morning, Mr. Pop." the little man nodded cheerfully and walked by.

These hospital workers, as well as thousands of New York's children, will never forget Mr. Pop. For over 14 years he came to the hospital regularly. For a long time he spent one morning or afternoon a week visiting the nine wards populated by boys and girls, stopping to talk with, or smile at, each bed's occupant, and moving on after leaving his calling card – a cellophane-wrapped lollipop.

Mr. Pop – 77 -year-old Hyman Kullick, a retired house painter distributed thousands of lollipops at Bellevue, although exact numbers are of no consequence in affairs of the heart. Children looked forward to his visits with the feeling usually reserved for the news that they are about to leave the hospital, while newcomers who had never seen Mr. Pop anxiously awaited the stocky gentleman they heard so much about.

If he was making his tour around lunch time, he would ask, "Have you had your lunch?" If the answer was yes, a work –worn hand went into the satchel and emerged with a candy-stick. But if the child hadn't eaten, Mr. Pop would say he will return or secure a promise that the candy wouldn't be eaten until after the noon meal.

"Lollipops are good for children," he would say. "They have a stick, so even the youngest child is safe with one. And they don't hurt sore throats 'cause they can be licked."

Then he added, "I've worked hard all my life, but always I thought about children and how I could help them enjoy themselves. Then I thought of lollipops and the hospital. The look on the children's' faces is something to see."

Mr. Pop was unwilling to calculate how much his candy-giving cost. "I worked years as a painter and saved a few dollars," he said, "You know how it is."

Mr. Pop himself had often been confined to Bellevue, for he needed treatments for arthritis. But whether he was a patient or a visitor, Mr. Pop was known and loved by thousands who didn't know his real name or anything about him except that he was good, and cheerful, and delighted in spreading happiness.




